As we ease out of lockdown, the Mental Health Foundation has published some <u>useful advice</u> on how to maintain your mental health.



America's Book of Secrets - Episode 2 Freemasons - available on Netflix, the episode explores the secret history and rituals of the Freemasons, a "clandestine society with a membership so powerful it helped shape America".

Ancient Illuminati - Riddles in Stone - available on Amazon Prime. This film explores the occult history behind the Masonic and Rosicrucian influence so prevalent amongst the Illuminati's Founding Fathers as they planned the layout of America's Capitol. For years, extreme controversy has abounded as to the exact meaning of the occult symbols found within the street layout, the buildings, and the monuments of Washington, D.C. Get the facts in this in-depth investigation.

Jerusalem and the Lost Temple of Jews - available on Amazon Prime. In honour of God, Solomon built the first temple in Jerusalem but it was destroyed by the Babylonians. A second temple built by King Herod was also dismantled by the Romans. This compelling story goes through history to figure out where these two temples were built and where a third might be built before the Messiah's return.

Inside the Freemasons: The Grand Lodge Uncovered - available from Amazon Prime. This documentary discusses the hidden rituals and buried secrets of the Freemasons, including a glimpse inside UGLE.

Da Vinci Code Decoded - available from Amazon Prime, it is the definitive documentary on the theories behind the novel
